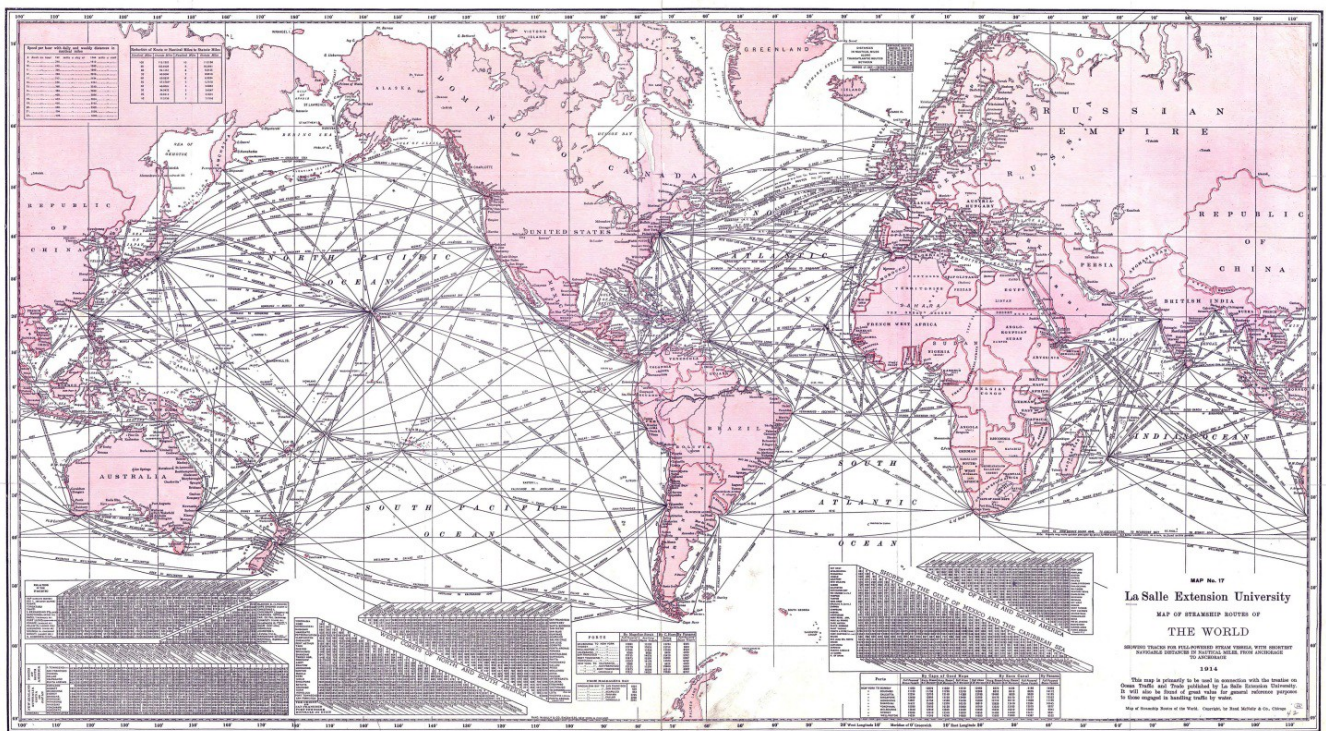


# RESEARCH COLLOQUIUM IN EXTRA-EUROPEAN AND GLOBAL HISTORY
